What is the SLS?

Replica of the the England and Wales Longitudinal Study (ONS-LS)

Based on Census data

SLS is a 5.5% representative sample of the Scottish population

Selection based on 20 birthdays

Approximately 274,000 SLS members have been identified from the 1991 census and information for these individuals will be linked from other datasets, including the

Why was it established?

The SLS provides a high quality longitudinal research dataset that can be used to provide an insight into the social circumstances and health of the Scottish population

Data sources

Census

- 1991 Census, 2001 Census
- Including data on occupation, economic activity, social class, housing, ethnicity, age, sex, marital status, household composition, health, education, country of birth, migration, workplace, religion etc.

Vital statistics




